




Sketching in 2D Two Dimensions.

A sketch is a quick rough drawing of an idea or picture. Sketching is very important in design technology and graphics we use it to show an idea.


2D means drawing just one side of an object.

HOW TO SKETCH - drawing a shape.

- 1. Draw a box about the same size as you want your drawing.
- 2. Sketch roughly where you think things are. Use lines and boxes.
- 3. Sketch in any curved edges.
- 4. Draw in darker the lines and curves you want.




Here are the rough lines for a hair-dryer.






