Many of the students attended the hundreds of intervention sessions that our staff provided in their own free time to try and support them in their learning. They turned up after school and during holidays to try and ensure that they get the best possible results. It was great to see them on their Year 11 Leaver's Day and we are all looking forward to their Prom.

We always have staff moving onto pastures new at this time of year and it is important that we say goodbye to some of our staff who are leaving. Mrs Lucas and Mr Allard are both retiring after the end of a long and successful career in the teaching profession and we wish them both a long and happy retirement. Mr Mundell is moving across town to take up a leadership post at Beacon Academy and we wish him all the best in his new role. Miss Wilkinson is leaving the teaching profession and retraining. Mrs Barnatt is moving to Clee Academy and Miss Peers is going on maternity leave. Miss Wilson is leaving us to move to our sister Academy in MediaCity in Manchester so she can be near her family (we have already told them how great she is and how lucky they are to have her). We would like to thank them all for all their hard work and wish them luck and good wishes for the future.

Reading for Pleasure



The Yoto Carnegie award is one of the UK's longest running and best-loved children's book awards, recognising outstanding reading experiences created through writing and illustration in books for children and young people. The Yoto Carnegie Medal is awarded by children's librarians for an outstanding book written in English for children and young people.

Unique in that it is judged solely by librarians, the roll-call of past winners includes: Arthur Ransome, C.S. Lewis, Terry Pratchett, Philip Pullman, Noel Streatfeild, Sally Gardner and Elizabeth Acevedo. A lot of our students really enjoy reading the books on both the long list and the shortlist.

A national (and international) reading for pleasure initiative, the Carnegie Award Shadowing Scheme engages thousands of children and young people in reading the books on the shortlist via reading groups in schools and public libraries with dedicated educational reading resources and promotional materials to support each shortlist. Each year young people who take part in the scheme are invited to vote for their favourite book to win the Shadowers' Choice Award, which is announced alongside the Medal winner at the annual winners' ceremony. This year's winner for both the awards is October, by Katya Balen.

The Awards mission is: To champion librarians to inspire and empower the next generation to create a better world through books and reading.

Lincoln University Workshop





Y10 Match Report

Wintringham 7-3 Immingham (29/06/22)

Win Smash Ming In Goal Fest

Sports reporter Mr Cross watched Oasis Wintringham's impressive Y10 boys demolish Immingham to win the Plate Final at the Linden Club.

Both sides started brightly, and it didn't take long for Wintringham to open the scoring, with Kyron Tuplin converting from the spot after Will Read had been pushed. However, Immingham responded quickly and were unlucky to hit the post following a sharp counter-attack. Yet that was to be Immingham's best moment of a half that was largely spent under the cosh from wave after wave of Wintringham attacks. After an exquisite pass from Read led to a low cross from Tuplin, Dickson Obasuyi made it 2-0, and it seemed that there would only be one winner from that point onwards. Indeed, Wintringham began to turn on the style, with the marauding midfielder Keane Stark beating two players before curling in a long-range effort for 3-0. By half-time it was 4-0, with Obasuyi having added his second with a neat turn and finish inside the box. And the score-line even flattered Immingham, as Wintringham had had two goals chalked off, as well as Read hitting the crossbar with a long-range pile-driver.

It had been a devastating opening 40 minutes from the Grimsby side, but there was no let up after the break. Stark quickly added his second, before midfield maestro Read hit the woodwork again, allowing Obasuyi to mop up the rebound and claim his hat-trick. Now comfortably leading 6-0, Wintringham understandably relaxed a little, allowing Immingham back into the game. But they were frustrated on several occasions by a dominant display from Harry Gibbs in the Wintringham goal, who twice denied the Immingham striker when he was through one on one. Finally, Immingham achieved a deserved consolation to make it 6-1. Yet when they followed this up with two more goals in quick succession to make it 6-3, suddenly it seemed like an impossible comeback might be on. Normal service was soon resumed however, when some lovely football from Wintringham ended with Obasuyi laying the ball off for the ever-dangerous Tuplin to slot home his side's seventh and seal a richly deserved victory for Wintringham.

In the end the final whistle couldn't come soon enough for Immingham, who ultimately came up short against a more talented Wintringham side who had greater self-belief. Hat-trick hero Obasuyi will take the plaudits for his ruthless finishing, but credit must go to the whole team for a vintage display that will live long in the memory.

Duke of Edinburgh 2021-2022

Our first year!

This is Oasis Academy Wintingham's first year of completing the Duke of Edinburgh Award, and what an amazing first year it has been!

We became accredited in September 2021 and now, July 2022 we have successfully seen through our first cohort in the Bronze Award.


We also secured £4000 funding from DofE for camping equipment!

We had an overwhelming response from Y9 and overall 24 have been successful so far in completing their Bronze Award.

The expedition saw the participants working in teams planning a route and using a compass to navigate along the route. Each participant had to carry 10% of their body weight which included their tent, sleeping bag and food. They walked for approximately 16km per day and had to pitch their own tents and cook for themselves.



As DofE leaders, we also had the opportunity to camp (spot Mr Robinson's tent.....it's not the blue one).



All of the participants did themselves and the Oasis family proud. From amazing team work to morale boosting, it was clear to see just how much each participant had gained from the experience.



The participants have all had to commit their spare time each week to complete 4 different sections making up the overall Bronze Award.

They have completed sections in volunteering, skills and physical. While they were completing these sections, they were in training for their expedition. To complete their expedition, they had to complete a 'practice' expedition weekend and then the 'real' expedition weekend.

Volunteering saw the participants completing tasks and working for charities and companies; working for the local community. The skills sections saw them all learning something new and the physical sections was anything to do with sports. Every participant rose to the challenge, putting many of them outside of their comfort zones, and we as Duke of Edinburgh Coordinators could not have been prouder.

There were many tears, and many laughs which all built to form an amazing experience.

Each group on the practice expedition had an adult with them for guidance on the first day. On the second day, they were on their own....watching them walk away was a difficult experience for us as teachers, but the Duke of Edinburgh experience was worth it.

The 'real' expedition saw the participants work together in their groups without adults for the full weekend.

From September 2022 the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze award will be offered again to the new Year 9 students, and those in Year 10 will be able to progress onto their Silver award. There will be an assembly about this on our return from the summer break and there will also be a parents evening for those wishing to enrol.....watch this space!
